Welcome

to the inaugural Southwell Minster Organathon! 24 hours of continuous music, 12 organists (plus the potential for more), one professional choir and a lot of stamina will be required over the course of this unique event. But you might well be wondering, why are we doing such a crazy thing ...

Here in the Minster, we're fortunate to have not one but two organs in regular use. The Screen Organ 'speaks' east towards the High Altar and is in daily use for Evensong services in the Quire, and the Nave Organ accompanies hearty congregational singing in the Nave, as well as the Choir at Sunday Eucharists. Both of these organs need regular care and maintenance; in particular, we are preparing for the Screen Organ to have a complete overhaul—think a major service for a car ... but this machine costs £250,000 to service! The Organathon is being held to help raise money for this mammoth project. We're aiming to achieve £10,000 with our 24-hour musical marathon.

We really need your help, and we'll all have a little fun along the way. At our family event at 11am on Saturday 1 October you'll hear TV and film tunes like you've never heard them before. For the adventurous, you can take part in the craze that's sweeping the nation: 'champing'—church camping! At 10pm on Friday 30 September, snuggle down in your sleeping bag and enjoy an entire night of music, followed by a delicious hearty breakfast in the morning.

The Grande Finale concert on Saturday 1 October at 7pm marks the final hour of the Organathon. Our very own take on The Last Night of the Proms will be uplifting and lively, with plenty of opportunity for audience participation! Don't miss the Blindfold Challenge: during the concert our very own Director of Music will—if we raise enough funds—take on the challenge of performing one of the world's best-loved pieces of organ music wearing a blindfold. Come along to discover what he'll be playing, and to see if he's note-perfect (he says he will be!).

As our organists perform over the course of 24 hours, there are 10 ways to pledge your support for the Organathon, all set out in this booklet. Why not sponsor a particular organist, or a particular piece you would love to hear played? You might be a keen organist and fancy taking part—we have a limited number of slots available for organists (and pianists) to Pay to Play.

Project Screen Organ

The Screen Organ was built by Nicholson & Co in 1996 and is an instrument of tremendous power, but also of serenity and calm. It's an integral part of Minster life, accompanying both the daily round of worship and special moments in the life of our community—baptisms, weddings, and bidding farewell to loved ones.

Over time, dust and grime build up, and we have reached the point where restoration needs to be done to keep the organ in prime condition. Given the size and complexity of the refurbishment project, it can't take place on site.

Thousands of metal pipes and box springs will be transported to a warehouse in Malvern and will receive a thorough cleaning. All that will remain in the cathedral is the case, some bellows and several pipes that are too fragile or difficult to remove and will therefore be cleaned on site. A new memory system will be installed and the key action (which connects the keys to the pipes) will be regulated and fine-tuned.

Up close and personal

Do you wonder what it's like to play one of our magnificent organs but lack the skill (or bravery) to try? Here's the ultimate compromise: ride shotgun for 20 minutes! You'll live and breathe the twists and turns of top-quality musicianship as the professional organist next to you negotiates the Nave Organ's 46 stops, 3 manuals (keyboards) and 32 pedals. You might even get to pull a stop or two! Perfect for music-lovers who don't play a keyboard, or for any budding young musicians out there. If preferred, you can request this session in the Organ Loft, for the Screen Organ.

Ride shotgun at the organ console for £25 (20 minutes at a time of your choosing)

Pay to play

The ultimate opportunity to take control of our Nave Organ—feel the power of this majestic beast as you fill the Minster with your own sound. You'll have 15 minutes to play pieces of your choosing. It's advisable that you have some experience of playing a piano/keyboard/organ. Bring your favourite pieces along and pull out all the stops.

Jonathan Allsopp has been Assistant Director of Music at Southwell Minster since 2019. Before this he worked at the cathedrals of Westminster, Durham and Hereford.

George Balfour is Organ Scholar at Southwell Minster for this academic year, and has come to us from Chetham's School of Music in Manchester.

Stephen Bullamore is Director of Music at St Mary Magdalene, Newark, alongside other roles with choral societies, examining for ABRSM, and being Area Team Leader for RSCM Southwell and Notts.

Rosemary Field is the Organist of Worksop Priory. She was previously Deputy Director of the Royal School of Church Music (RSCM) and latterly its Head of Organ Studies.

Anthony Gray was Organ Scholar at Southwell Minster from 2018 to 2019, and now has an active freelance career alongside being Director of Music at St Wilfred's, Harrogate.

Paul Hale was Rector Chori of Southwell Minster from 1989 to 2016, and is now an active organ consultant. He still lives in Nottinghamshire.













Simon Hogan was Assistant Director of Music at Southwell Minster 2012–19; he moved on to Christ Church Cathedral, Oxford, and in December he will start as Sub-Organist and Assistant Director of Music at Southwark Cathedral.

Ben Mills was Organ Scholar at Southwell Minster from 2017 to 2018. Having completed his undergraduate studies in Oxford, he is now studying at the Royal Academy of Music in London.

Richard Moore was Organ Scholar at Southwell Minster 2007–08. Having studied in Oxford and London, he is now Sub Organist at Guildford Cathedral (the successor to our current Rector Chori!).

Paul Provost has been Rector Chori of Southwell Minster since 2016, where he oversees all aspect of the Cathedral's music. He was previously Sub Organist of Guildford Cathedral.

Hilary Punnett was Organ Scholar at Southwell Minster from 2011 to 2013, and since then has held posts at Lincoln and Chelmsford cathedrals; she is now pursuing an active freelance career.

Peter Siepmann studied at the University of Nottingham, and now holds roles at St Peter's, Nottingham and Repton School, and conducts the Nottingham Bach Choir.
